Routes to Pärnu:

- Via Baltica motorway (E67), the most important highway connecting the Baltic countries
- Airport Pärnu airport has a certificate for international flights but operates only between Estonian islands
- Pärnu Harbour is the main cargo port for export of timber from Estonia
- Marina of Pärnu yacht harbor was the first one in Eastern Europe to receive the Blue Flag
- Railway According to the the decision of European Counsil, the reconstruction of Rail Baltica from Berlin to Tallinn via Warsaw, Kaunas, Riga and Pärnu will start in 2014.



History...



Milestones in the history of Pärnu:

- 9000 BC The first settlement at the mouth of the Pärnu River was established,
- 1251 the first written record of Pärnu,
- 1711 G.W. Richmann was born in Pärnu
- 1838 the first bath-house was opened in Pärnu,
- In February 23rd, 1918, the Estonian State Independence was declared from the balcony of the theatre Endla in Pärnu,
- 1940 -1991 Pärnu as the whole territory of Estonia was occupied by the Soviet Union,
- In August 20th, 1991, the souverenity of the Estonian Republic was declared by Riigikogu (the Parliament)
- 2004 Estonia joined European Union,
- 2011 Estonia joined eurozone,
- 2011 The decision for construction of fast train connection Rail Baltica (Berlin-Warsovie-Riga-Pärnu-Tallinn) was made in Brussels.





In Kuninga (King) Street, the world famous scientist Georg Wilhelm Richmann was born in 1711. He was one of the first researchers of electricity and was killed by lightening in 1753.

- Territory of Pärnu: 32,2 km²
- The population of Pärnu: 40 000 citizens
- Pärnu has 12 twin and 7 partner cities in Europe and USA
- Pärnu is a member of Union of the Baltic Cities
- Pärnu belongs to the WHO European Healthy Cities Network
- Pärnu is a member of the League of Hanseatic Cities

Project: Restoration and Public Access of Coastal Habitats in Urban Environment "Urbancows"




Goal:

The overall goal of the project is to improve the favourable conservation status of the coastal meadow and lagoon habitats in City of Pärnu as well as the species characteristics to this habitat complex.

General information:

- Partners: The Environmental Board, Pärnu City Government, University of Tartu Pärnu College
- Funding:
 - Total cost: 1 138 413 EUR
 - Requested European Union contribution: 853 809 EUR
 - Beneficiaries' contribution: 284 604 EUR
- Area: 250 ha
- Project period: 2012-2016







Pärnu is a sportive and healthy city.






Every autumn around 2 500 – 3 000 runners participate in Jüri Jaanson's two bridges run which is an international marathon of 9km competiton in crosscountry running.






Jüri Jaanson, the citizen of Pärnu, was a silver medal winner of the Olympic games in Athens (2004) and Beijing (2008) in rowing.







The visualisation of the Jaanson's path way.






The Jaanson's pathway recreation area.



Daily life is much more severe

- In January 9th, 2005, an unseen storm attacked the Pärnu Bay.
- Sea-level raised about 3 metres.
- 700 houses were caught by the cold sea water in the town of Pärnu.
- 500 farms were flooded in Pärnu county.





The blue line marks flood up to 2,5m, the red line marks rise of sea level up to 3 metres.

On the left bank of Pärnu River there are wide areas for future development. What could be our challenge if the world economy won't brisken?






In the right bank of Pärnu River, there was a huge metal works.

Between Koidula Museum and the riverside, there is located a huge sawdust port which makes the area very noisy and dusty.





As the export has slowed down, there are more silent days at the harbour.





The only bridge in the town center is a gateway from Pärnu to Tallinn.





The quay in the town center was closed for shipping a dozen years ago but hasn't found any new goal. January 2012.





February 2013. The Pärnu Ice Festival was launched here, on the territory of the former cargo port.....
